Dear Secretary Noem, Commissioner Scott, and Acting Director Groffy,

We write to express our profound concern and seek immediate transparency regarding reports that U.S. Border Patrol agents—in conjunction with Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service—arrested two firefighters while they were battling the 9,000-acre Bear Gulch wildfire on the Olympic Peninsula in Washington.¹ According to multiple sources, these individuals were detained while actively engaged in emergency response efforts as a result of work contracts being terminated with two firms.² While the recent press release from U.S. Customs and Border Protection attempts to frame this incident as a routine verification of contractor records following terminations, the outcome—armed enforcement officers detaining firefighters in the middle of an emergency response—makes clear that this quickly escalated beyond a matter of contract compliance. The two arrests and dozens of firefighters temporarily sidelined during an active wildfire raise questions about the priorities and judgement exercised by federal agencies.

We should not have to tell you that wildland firefighting is one of the most dangerous and critical public safety duties, especially during what has become one of Washington's largest active fires. The arrest of these hardworking crew members, who put their lives on the line to perform lifesaving duties, is not making our communities safer, no matter the rhetoric you use on TV. The Trump Administration's thoughtless and cruel immigration enforcement at any cost undermines coordinated emergency response efforts.

Standard emergency protocols are intended to shield first responders working in hazardous environments from enforcement interventions and we are concerned that these were not adhered

to. Fire response was compromised while 44 firefighters were forced to stand in line to show their identification and answer questioning. This incident follows a pattern of lack of accountability for federal immigration enforcement officers.

Given the severity of this incident, I request your office provide the following information as soon as possible, and no later than September 12:


1. In 2021, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) released a statement where the agency noted that they would refrain from immigration enforcement at “locations where disaster and emergency response and relief is being provided”, unless there are “exigent circumstances.”³
 - a. Is this policy still in place? If not, what internal guidelines are in place to ensure that agents refrain from law enforcement activities that could interfere with emergency response?
 - b. What specific exigent circumstances, if any, warranted the arrest of firefighters who were actively battling a 9,000-acre wildfire?
2. How do DHS, ICE, CBP and other federal agencies plan to support state and local firefighting agencies, if they plan to continue the abrupt interruption of lifesaving emergency response?
3. How will the actions of the agents involved be reviewed or overseen, and what processes are in place to ensure compliance with federal response protocol?
4. How were standard incident command protocols and interagency coordination applied, and what steps were taken to secure prior agency approval?
5. How does DHS plan to share findings from after-action reports or internal reviews assessing agent adherence to applicable standards during operations in emergency areas?
6. Where are the firefighters who were detained being held? Have these individuals been given a meaningful opportunity to communicate regularly with legal counsel?

Our communities—our residents, local governments, and first responders—deserve clear and immediate answers. Emergencies like wildfires demand collaboration and mutual support across agencies. The firefighters in question deserve respect, clarity, and assurance that their critical duties won’t be hindered by reckless enforcement actions. Arresting folks who risk their lives to protect public safety is not acceptable by any stretch of the imagination.


